

Year 7 Literacy and Numeracy catch Up Premium Grant 2019-2020

The literacy and numeracy catch-up premium gives schools additional funding to support year 7 pupils who did not achieve at least level 4 in reading or maths at the end of key stage 2 (KS2). The funding provided is based on £500 per eligible pupil and is determined using the data from the autumn census.

Year 7 literacy and numeracy catch-up premium funding 2018-2019 allocation:

The Year 7 Catch up Premium 2019-2020 allocation is based autumn 2019 census and the funding indication is estimated at £17,254.90. This is based on current Year 7 cohort of 39 pupils.

How the funding will be spent and objectives determined:

As in previous years, the school has assessed the needs of the pupils in the current cohort to decide the most appropriate strategy to improve literacy and numeracy levels. For 2019-2020 we are looking to use all of the monies for the provision of a teaching assistant to provide the support directly for the year 7's literacy and numeracy as all pupils in the cohort will benefit from additional support being available to support with their additional SEND needs.

20% have made steps toward a spelling age of 5 years over the course of the year.

14.3% have maintained their reading age throughout the year.

2.85% have made 1-5 months spelling age progress over the course of the year.

17.1% have made 6-11 months spelling age progress over the course of the year.

17.1% have made 12-17 months spelling age progress over the course of the year.
28.6% have made 18+ months spelling age progress over the course of the year.

3% have made steps toward a reading of 5 years over the course of the year.
18.2% have maintained their reading age throughout the year.
12.1% have made 1-5 months reading age progress over the course of the year.
21.2% have made 6-11 months reading age progress over the course of the year.
12.1% have made 12-17 months reading age progress over the course of the year.
33.3% have made over 18 months plus reading age progress over the course of the year.

Numeracy

11.5% have made steps toward a maths age of 5 years over the course of a year.
15.3% have maintained their maths age throughout the year.
11.5% have made 1-5 months maths age progress over the course of the year.
34.6% have made 6-11 months maths age progress over the course of the year.
3.8% have made 12-17 months maths age progress over the course of the year.
23% have made over 18 months of maths age progress over the course of the year.

For 2017-18 we are looking to use all of the monies for the provision of a teaching assistant to provide the support directly for the year 7's literacy and numeracy.

Educational Impact of the Literacy and Numeracy catch up premium funding for 2017-2018:

After analysis of Year 7 2017-2018 school data, the literacy and numeracy levels of the Year 7 cohort can be seen to have made excellent progress over the year.

18.18% have made steps toward a spelling age of 5 years over the course of the year.
18.18% have maintained their reading age throughout the year.
15.15% have made 1-5 months spelling age progress over the course of the year.

15.15% have made 6-11 months spelling age progress over the course of the year.
9.09% have made 12-17 months spelling age progress over the course of the year.
18.18% have made 18+ months spelling age progress over the course of the year.

8.8% have made steps toward a reading of 5 years over the course of the year.
17.6% have maintained their reading age throughout the year.
23.5% have made 1-5 months reading age progress over the course of the year.

Numeracy

17.6% have made steps toward a maths age of 5 years over the course of a year.
20.5% have maintained their maths age throughout the year.
17.6% have made 1-5 months maths age progress over the course of the year.
17.6% have made 6-11 months maths age progress over the course of the year.
11.8% have made 12-17 months maths age progress over the course of the year.
14.7% have made over 18 months of maths age progress over the course of the year.

Year 7 literacy and numeracy catch-up premium funding 2016-2017 allocation:

The Year 7 Catch up Premium 2016-2017 allocation is based autumn 2016 census and the funding indication was estimated at £13,935. This was based on the Year 7 cohort.

How the funding will be spent and objectives determined:

As in previous years, the school assessed the needs of the individual pupils to decide the most appropriate strategy to improve literacy and numeracy levels. For 2016-17 we were looking to raise % of pupils achieving medium and high targets in English and Mathematics so majority of pupils are achieving these aspirational targets. The key to this was the development of effective literacy and numeracy skills. We provided funding to improve access to technology and an improved library service.
